Curricular choirs

<u>Choralaires – 23 members this year</u> 6th hour, Red Days, freshmen and sophomores A beginning mixed choir, for experienced and new singers.

<u>Cantorum-23 members this year</u> 3[™] hour, Grey Days, juniors and seniors An advanced mixed choir, for experienced musicians.

Course Description

Both Choralaires and Cantorum perform music spanning the Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Impressionistic, Contemporary and World Music traditions.

Students in these ensembles focus on the fundamentals of proper breath, posture, and placement to produce a relaxed and open vocal tone. As singers advance, there is an increased emphasis on balance, blend, part independence, the singing of foreign languages, and lifelong musicianship. In addition to learning and performing repertoire, students in these ensembles regularly sight-read, audiate, compose, and write about music.

Every choir student receives weekly voice lessons which develop the individual singer. Lessons reinforce concepts learned in class, and help prepare students for opportunities in solo and ensemble festivals, honor choirs, and music at the collegiate level.

Daily Requirements

To receive full daily participation points, all choir students should:

- 1. Be seated in their assigned chair before the bell rings.
- 2. Put away all personal belongings underneath their chair.
- 3. Have their folder, handbook, and a sharpened pencil.
- 4. Get rid of gum, candy, and all choking hazards before class.
- 5. Be respectful to their peers, their teacher, and the choir room.
- 6. Participate fully in all aspects of class be ready to sing!

Sight Singing and Audiation

Each week in rehearsal the choir will complete sight singing and audiation exercises taken from one of several books or software programs. These exercises are intended to improve musicianship by reinforcing aural and reading skills.

Writing/Composing Assignments

Students will be asked to respond in writing as part of three yearly concert critiques, and other written responses to music listening. Choir students will also complete a group composition project each year.

Music Reading Skills

Students may be assigned short worksheets to practice their music reading skills, including understanding and writing music notation, musical symbols, vocabulary, key signatures and time signatures. Practicing these concepts is embedded into our rehearsal of music each year, but will improve each time we review our skills.

<u>Technology</u>

Much of our course content and a course calendar are available on our choir website, <u>www.plattevillechoirs.weebly.com</u>. Student and department laptops will be able to access music resources, practice tools, and enrichment material to reinforce what is covered in class. Teacher and student use of software for music notation, recording, warmups, guided practice, and smart accompaniment is encouraged.

Assessment

A performance assessment, usually a quartet check-off, will occur following each of the three concert units. A project or written assessment will occur following units on composition, music reading, and voice function. Professional adjudicators will assess solo/ensemble performances at festival.

Vocal Rest

Students who are unable to sing for any medical reason may use a vocal rest day up to twice per semester. **Students must request a vocal rest day from Mrs. Armstrong before rehearsal begins.** Full daily participation points can be earned by filling out a vocal rest form and turning it into Mrs. Armstrong at the end of rehearsal. A sample form can be found in this handbook.

Music Pass

Students with a scheduled lesson do not need a pass, and should report directly to the choir room at their specified time. Students wishing to utilize their study hall time for extra practice **must see a music teacher ahead of time** to obtain a music pass.

Solo and Ensemble / Third Quarter Performance Project During third quarter, all students prepare a piece from the WSMA list. This is typically a vocal solo, but can be an ensemble with teacher permission. To receive full credit, students choose one or more of the following performance venues:

- 1. Perform at District Solo/Ensemble Festival.
- 2. Perform for the class.
- 3. Perform for at least two peers in a formal setting.
- 4. Perform at a public event, i.e. wedding or church service.

Rehearsal Makeups

Choir students can be 'excused absent' from class twice per quarter without penalty. The third and subsequent times a student misses choir for any reason earns a zero for daily participation. Upon completion of rehearsal makeups, a student may earn back their points. Rehearsal makeups can include article reviews, outside concert attendance, or music volunteer time, and forms are located in the music hallway. Unexcused absences will earn a zero and are not eligible for rehearsal makeups. Every choir student receives weekly voice lessons each quarter. Based on availability, upperclassmen will be given priority for individual lessons. Students can earn up to 12 points and a stamp in their handbook for each lesson completed. There will be four to six voice lessons during each quarter.

Students are able to make up lessons missed due to illness or schoolrelated conflict for full credit within the grading period. Unexcused lesson absences can be made up for a maximum of 10/12 points no more than **twice per quarter** at the teacher's discretion. Lesson schedules are posted on the choir website, in the choir room and the IMC. **Students should check these schedules weekly to confirm their lesson time.** The voice lesson calendar for 2018-2019 follows the stamp chart.

Concerts are worth 50 points each, and are a major part of the quarter grade. To receive full points, students are expected to:

- 1. Arrive early for the scheduled warmup time.
- 2. Wear appropriate concert dress as outlined below.
- 3. Practice good concert etiquette, stay for entire concert.
- 4. Give their best effort to represent the work they have done.
- 5. Put away and clean up all equipment after the concert.

Concert Dress

All choir students will wear music department formalwear, and will change into concert apparel at school. Students may choose whether they prefer a tux or gown. Students **MUST** wear the following items beneath their tux and gown:

<u>TUX:</u> White dress shirt (long or short sleeved), black dress pants, black socks, black dress shoes. [Tux coat, cummerbund and bowtie provided.]

<u>GOWN</u>: Natural colored nylons or knee-highs and black flats. [Black gown provided.]

<u>Note:</u> Local thrift stores have an excellent variety of concert dress clothes. In an emergency, the Music Department does have a limited supply of concert dress clothes. Please see any music teacher.

Concert Absence Policy

Only concert absences due to illness or family emergency will be considered excused. All other absences will be considered unexcused.

A unique thing about choir is that evening and weekend activities are graded as class work. Three concerts per year are a critical part of your grade. Each student is responsible for communicating important music events to parents, coaches, employers, and any other activity leaders. Extra copies of the music calendar for 2017-2018 are available for this purpose.

If a student misses a concert due to work conflict, athletic contest, family event, or any other outside activity, it will be considered unexcused, and the student will receive a 0 for their concert grade. Makeup assignments will not be offered for unexcused absences.

Excused absences due to illness or family emergency must be called in (342-4020 x2200) or emailed (<u>armstrong@platteville.k12.wi.us</u>) by a parent or guardian **prior to the concert** in order for the student to receive a makeup assignment. Makeup assignments consist of a short paper to be chosen from several topics.
